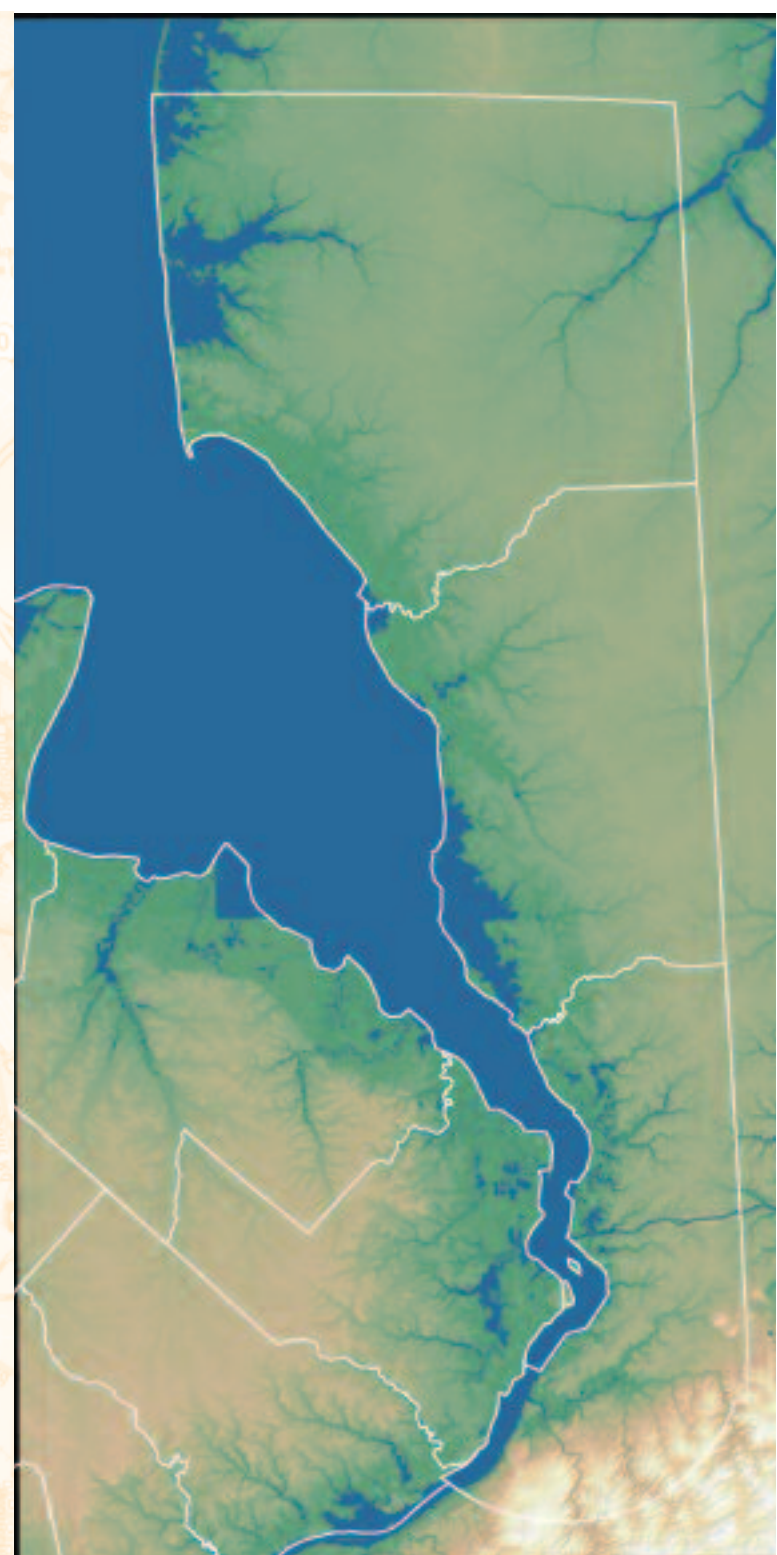


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NORTHERN DELAWARE AND WILMINGTON HERITAGE MAP

White Clay Creek National Wild & Scenic River: White Clay Creek is a Bi-State Preserve and federally designated as a National Wild & Scenic River. Managed through a partnership of the White Clay Creek Watershed Management Committee and the National Park Service, the creek is renowned for its scenery, opportunities for birding and trout fishing, and historic features.



Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route (W3R): The W3R is a 620-mile route marked by thousands of allied American and French soldiers during the American Revolution, as part of the 1780-1783 Yorktown Campaign. 26 miles of the nine-state route is located in northern Delaware.



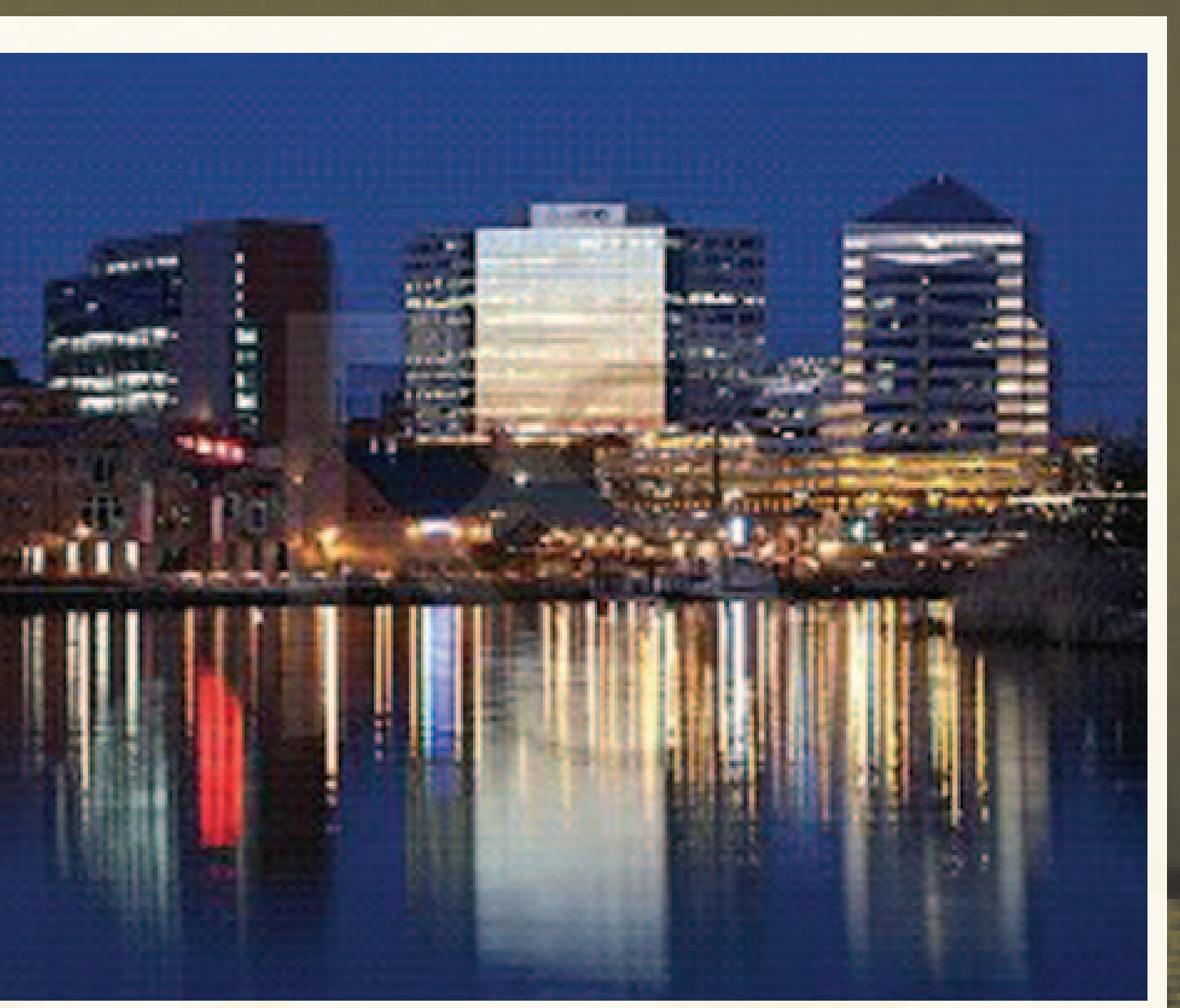
Brandywine Valley National Scenic Byway: An unparalleled concentration of historic sites, glorious gardens, magnificent estates and museums is nestled within the rolling country. side, a testament to the lasting influence of the DuPont family dynasty.



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East Coast Greenway (ECG): An urban greenway connected by a primary off-road, multi-use trail system linking 25 major cities from Maine to Florida. In northern Delaware, the ECG is the spine of a heritage trail network linking communities to their cultural, historic & recreational assets.



WILMINGTON

Duration: 30-45 mins

Wilmington has been the region's economic and cultural heart from 1638 continuing into its current period of revitalization. Throughout its history, the city has seen important developments in industry and commerce, culture and the arts, immigration, religious freedom, and civil rights. Its Downtown, riverfront, and neighborhoods offer a rich tapestry of urban experiences.



1.a. Wilmington Train Station

Celebrating its centennial, Wilmington's train station is critical to the City's history and continuing economic vitality. The location has long been notable: Washington camped here in 1781, and it served as an important Underground Railroad crossing. It boasts the last remaining campus of buildings designed by architect Frank Furness.

1.b. Wilmington Riverfront/Dravo Plaza

A location central to Wilmington's naval shipbuilding heritage, Dravo Plaza sits in the midst of historic shipbuilding structures and burgeoning riverfront revitalization. During World War II, more than 200 ships were made here. Surrounded by shopping, entertainment, and wildlife, it is now both a memorial and site for public events.

1.c. Wilmington's West End/Little Italy

This historic immigrant community has been part of Wilmington's cultural heritage since the late 1800s. A neighborhood of shops, restaurants and residences, Little Italy is home to historic St. Anthony of Padua Church, and its Italian Festival, held every June. Historic Bancroft Parkway and Union Park Gardens are located nearby.

1.d. Wilmington's Rockford Park Area and Delaware Art Museum

Delaware Art Museum has been located on scenic and historic Kentmere Parkway since 1912. Near the sweeping overlooks of Rockford Park and the vibrant Trolley Square district, the museum is home to the nation's largest Pre-Raphaelite collection, a sculpture garden and major collections of American illustration and turn-of-the-century art.

1.e. Downtown Wilmington and Rodney Square

Rodney Square represents the heart of Downtown Wilmington. Surrounded by historic structures and featuring the Caesar Rodney statue minted on the Delaware state quarter, the square hosts several festivals and nearby theater events each year. Several important African-American historic sites are located to the south and east.

1.f. Swede's Landing/7th Street Peninsula

European and free African settlers first landed in present-day Wilmington at this site in 1638. Old Swedes Church – the oldest continuously operating congregation in the country – is here, as are the Kalmr Nyckel Shipyard and Fort Christina Park. Nearby, visitors can view the confluence of the Brandywine Creek and the Christina River.
